

Thank you for being there to sing from your hearts into mine A grace that I will carry in my heart all of my life.


Thank you, Ben! And thank you to Maralee McMillan and all those who helped with the logistics and financial support of these concerts that we offer to our community.

#### **Garden Update**

One potato, two potato, three potato, four....Just the other day, the garden crew dug up 160 **pounds** of potatoes for IAM!!



This is a yellow/brown potato plant that looks like it's diseased or dead. Don't be fooled! That is exactly what we eagerly wait for because it's a sign that the potatoes are ready to be harvested. You might remember in a previous article that we planted about 150 lbs



of seed potatoes a couple of months ago. Many more pounds will be ready to harvest in the next few weeks so, all told, we'll have a great return from our initial planting.



Remember those turnip seeds glued to strips of toilet tissue? So far, 12 pounds of turnips have been harvested and not a scrap of toilet tissue in sight! Along with the potatoes and turnips, we have harvested 40 pounds of onions. That brings the total poundage we have taken to IAM so far this summer to 173 pounds!

As good as our harvest has been so far, we have had a few challenges in the last couple of months.... a four-legged critter has taken up residency in the garden who likes to dine on the tender shoots of our bush green beans (However, as you can see, the bean plants are still producing blossoms which will soon develop into nice healthy green beans). The bush beans will be ready to harvest in a



few weeks. On the other hand, the pole beans which are growing up the 15foot vertical frame are not included on the critter's menu because they are not
within reach. This is definitely a benefit of vertical planting! The pole bean plants are thriving and will
be a heavy producer of beans to take to IAM.

All in all, the garden crew is very happy with the harvest so far and look forward to taking more produce to IAM in the coming weeks.

As always, if you have the time, please stop by the garden to say hello, or honk your car horn as you drive by to acknowledge their dedication to providing fresh produce to those who do not have access to fresh, healthy food.

**NEWS FLASH**: Just before the chronicle was published, 63 more pounds of a combination of pole beans and potatoes were taken to IAM. NOW the total comes up to (drum roll)....236 pounds!




A new pot replaced the cracked one, and Angelonia, Petite Petunias, Dusty Miller, and Lantana decorate the pots.



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



### Service & Giving Volunteer Agency of the Month - Bullington Gardens



Bullington Gardens, a 12-acre public botanical garden, not only demonstrates the beauty and value of native and ornamental plants through themed public gardens — it also provides hands-on education in horticulture and other sciences to students and adults. Through science-based horticultural education, Bullington connects children and adults with the natural world and works to enhance the life skills of those with physical or mental challenges.

**Horticultural Therapy** (HT) techniques are employed at Bullington to assist participants in learning new skills or regaining those that have been lost. These therapies help to improve memory, cognitive abilities, task initiation, language skills, and socialization — plus helping with physical rehabilitation to strengthen muscles and to improve coordination, balance, and endurance.

Bullington's (HT) program brings **Henderson County Public School students** with special needs – who otherwise would have difficulty joining in due to physical and mental disabilities – a weekly opportunity to connect with nature and to develop socialization skills, rehabilitation, and wellness. Based in the **therapy garden and greenhouse**, the program centers on plants-based activities where **s**tudents tend their own gardens, create nature crafts, and enjoy exploring the gardens/grounds.

An additional horticultural therapy **pilot program to serve Seniors** in both independent and assisted living was introduced this past year.


Observations from the Garden: Increases selfesteem (over time) and socialization among often isolated groups, decreases anxiety, improves communication, creates connection to each other & the surrounding world.




