A Message from our Moderator, Bob McLendon

My son Patrick graduated from Mercer University with a degree in Philosophy. I remember kidding him that when I looked in the newspaper for employment opportunities, I did not see any listing for a Philosopher. Lately I have been reading some philosophy books trying to imagine what sparked Patrick interest in this discipline. Borden Parker [1847-1910] taught Philosophy at Boston Univ. for 30 years and he wrote a lot about the " moral and ethical life " He wrote " our moral task is to make this life, so far as possible an expression of rational goodwill. The greatest need in ethics is the unselfish will to do the right thing ." His point was that errors in ethical judgment arise less from willful lying than from indifference to truth and doing the right thing. Social righteousness may be clearly expressed in our laws and constitution, but it lives only in the "moral vigilance" of the people. I am grateful that our church First Congregational has enlightened all of us in the importance of moral and ethical vigilance.
