A Message from Our Moderator, Bob McLendon

I wanted to thank all of you who attended our Annual Congregational Meeting on Sunday Jan 26. Approximately 100 members attended which far exceeded what is needed for a quorum. We are a congregational church which means our members elect our leaders, finalize our budget, approve any expenditures over \$10,000 and give wide range of recommendations to our Ministries. Your voice is important and needed. We will have another important opportunity for our congregation to give guidance to our elected leadership on Sunday Feb. 23 at 9am Forum which will be conducted by our Church Council. At the closing of our recent Annual Meeting as Moderator I had the opportunity to make a few remarks about the year ahead - 2025 for FCC. Below is a brief summary of my remarks for those who were not able to attend.

Summary of Moderator Bob Mc Lendon remarks at closing of Annual Meeting of FCC Jan. 26, 2025: Your Facilitators of Ministries and Church Council have a clear sense of purpose but more importantly we see our work not as a task but as a blessing. Church Council Meeting Highlights for January's Meeting - 2025

Year End Financial Results were exceptionally good!

- o Total Income YTD was \$39,668 more than budgeted.
- o Total Expenses YTD were \$925 more than budgeted.
- o The Net Result of the General Operating Fund YTD was \$38,743*- better than budgeted.
 - Although our investments were not as good in December, we still ended the year in good shape.
 - The Church Council voted to move the \$38,743* better than budgeted Net Results to the property maintenance fund.
 - The Church Council approved the 2025 Final Budget presented at the Annual Congregational Meeting.
 - The Buddy K band will perform in the Fellowship Hall Saturday, February 15 at 3 PM. Snacks and drinks will be served.
 - The Council voted to allow the PPRM group to delay nominations and election of new members until the completion of the Bylaws revisions.
 - Two Council members will not be seeking waivers or re-election: Linda Laderach, Facilitator of the Ministry of Worship and Mindy Myers, Facilitator of the Ministry of Physical Resources.
 - We were given a beautiful Grand Piano, located in the Fellowship Hall, by Jan Kelly.

Broadly Aspirational

Internal Church Activity

- -Encourage more young families. More child participation within the church service. Children being A PART of (connected to) the whole church, not apart.
- -Do work on racism & classism.
- -I dream/imagine about a praise & worship time, singing songs of contemporary Christian artists.
- -A church that has pastoral associates (volunteers) who can assist the ministers with more routine pastoral type visits.
- -Healing HeART together! I would like to facilitate an ongoing healing arts group.









Strengthening Our Connections:



As a congregation, we regularly look for ways to strengthen connections with each other. One way to do that is to warmly welcome all to coffee hour following the service.

Toward that end, you'll notice two changes at upcoming coffee hours:

- 1) one or more long "community" tables will be set up to make it easier to meet and talk with each other; and
- 2) a designated volunteer will be on hand to guide interested parties to the community tables and introduce them to others seated there. This may be particularly helpful for newer members and visitors. A sheet will be available at coffee hour to sign up to be a coffee hour guide. Please take advantage of this important opportunity that requires little time but could mean so much to someone who is easily overwhelmed by large gatherings.

We can all do our part in welcoming others, as Karla has mentioned, by inviting those we don't know—either before the service begins, during the Holy Hello time, or immediately following the service—to join us at coffee hour, a Friendship Dinner or a Sunday morning Forum session.

There are so many ways to be welcomed and feel welcome at FCCUCC. These small changes are meant to strengthen connections already made and create new ones. Do you have other ideas on how we might accomplish that? Use the attendance pad found in the pews to write any suggestions.









FCCH at MLK Day of Service



We packed 952 meals for families of 4 (3808 single meals) plus 160 extra bean packages. At least 200 volunteers, including Gov. Stein and Mrs. Stein, participated. Funds allocated by FCC and other area congregations made possible the purchase of supplies.

Social Justice and Community Involvement



Feed the Kids Coalition is a 501(c)(3) organization comprised of teams from many Henderson County faith-based and civic groups who care about the health and welfare of local children. In 2013, the formal non-profit Feed the Kids Coalition was established. Six community teams rotate every six weeks, feeding 275–350 youth different meals each Friday in about one hour. <u>Team #1, volunteers from First Congregational and St. James only,</u>

has contributed thousands of volunteer hours, in-kind donations and lots of kitchen time in their rotations. Beyond all the food buying, preparation and serving, something far more profound happens. While providing basic nutrition, there is time to talk and to listen, to each other and the kids. Relationships are created with the children, friendships formed, traditions built. The volunteers have a really good time in the kitchen as well, preparing the entrée, veggies and fruit.

There are many ways to plug in – shopping, food preparation* (chopping to stirring and all in between), serving, transporting and cleaning up.
